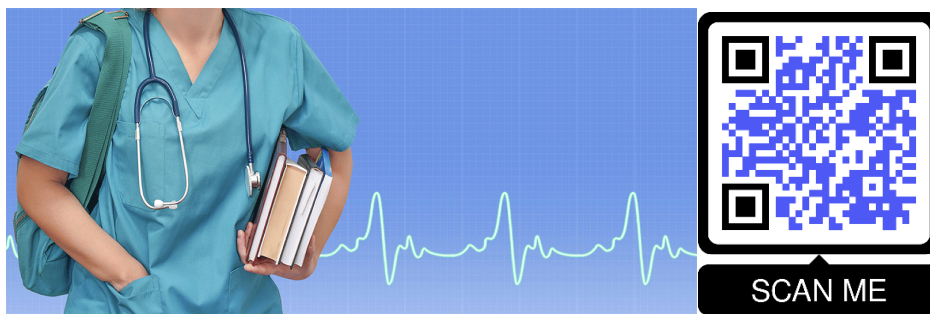




## UW-Green Bay Nursing and Health Studies Degree Options

### DIRECT ENTRY INTO NURSING

#### **Traditional Bachelor's of Science in Nursing (BSN) (4-Year Program)**

#### **NURSE 1-2-1**

The NURSE 1-2-1 is offered through the combined resources of the nursing programs at UW-Green Bay and Northeast Wisconsin Technical College (NWTC). The program offers high school graduates a four-year Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing (BSN) taking courses in **Year 1** at UW-Green Bay; **Years 2 and 3** at NWTC to complete an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN); and at UW-Green Bay for **Year 4** to complete the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree. Students can enjoy a traditional college experience, including living on campus, and take advantage of high quality, nationally accredited expertise at both UW-Green Bay and NWTC.

#### **Marinette Nursing Track**

Similar to NURSE 1-2-1, this pathway prepares students for in-demand careers while staying in the Marinette area. This pathway starts in **Year 1** with General Studies at the UW-Green Bay Marinette Campus. In **Years 2 and 3**, students earn an Associate's Degree in Nursing from the NWTC

Marinette Campus. **Year 4** is online at UW-Green Bay to complete a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing degree. <https://www.uwgb.edu/marinette/about/bachelor-pathway/>

### **LTC 2-2-1 Pathway (Ideal for students in the Manitowoc/Sheboygan area)**

Students spend **2 years** on the UWGB-Manitowoc or UWGB-Sheboygan campus completing an Associate of Arts and Sciences (AAS) degree, and then **2 years** at Lakeshore Technical College earning an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) degree. This is followed by **1 year** at UWGB for a Bachelor of Science in Nursing completion degree. This means earning three degrees in only five years! The advantages of this pathway include: paying less to attend UW-Green Bay's Manitowoc or Sheboygan campuses; participating in campus events at all campuses; paying lower tuition at LTC than four-year universities; possible tuition reimbursement by your employer if you are working as a RN during your final year; selecting courses that are available in-person, online, and in hybrid format; and having family and friends close by for support. <https://www.uwgb.edu/2-2-1-pathway/>
