Past year's evaluations from individual faculty showed slight inconsistencies per same course outcome. Art faculty will improve/develop rubric indicating more detailed grading categories early spring for more objective/consistent evaluations.

5. Which course or group of students will you assess on the outcome chosen above and when?

Senior Exhibition participants. As of December 15, 2017, we have four students in painting, two in textiles, two in ceramics, two in printmaking, one in photography, totaling 11 student (the number of participants can slightly change through the rest of academic year). The Senior Exhibition will be held in April 2018, and Art faculty will evaluate the coursework during the first week of May.
