1. Please give a brief overview of the assessment data you collected this year.

All Council on Social Work Education programs measure and report student learning outcomes. Students are assessed on their mastery of the competencies that comprise the accreditation standards of the Council on Social Work Education. These competencies are dimensions of social work practice that all social workers are expected to master during their professional training. A measurement benchmark is set by the social work programs for each competency. An assessment score at or above that benchmark is considered by the program to represent mastery of that particular competency. In the UW Green Bay BSW program, student mastery of the ten competencies is assessed through a series of assignments across the junior and senior curriculum and their final field evaluations for their senior field placement. The aggregate data are reflected in the table below.
