

## Semester Programs Costs

Keep in mind that these are *estimated costs*, especially personal spending, and actual costs may vary. You can find the most updated costs and explanations under the Budget Sheets on the individual program websites.

*Current as of December 2017*

Costs below are estimated for *one semester*.

Each estimated cost includes tuition (or program fee), room and board, administrative fees, UW System insurance, estimated airfare, visa, transportation, food/meals and miscellaneous costs.

## WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

**Exchange** semester programs are programs where students pay UW-Green Bay tuition to go abroad.

**Direct Enroll** semester programs are where students pay the tuition of their host university.

Both types of programs vary in housing prices, costs of living in that country, and additional insurance and/or visa fees, which also make the differences in cost.

## Interim Programs

Interim programs are intensive study experiences administered through our partner institutions during interim periods such as summer or winter break.

Most interim programs have an estimated cost of \$4,500-\$6,500. This cost breakdown is similar to semester programs and includes estimates of expected costs.

## Faculty-led Travel Courses

Travel courses are short term programs that are taught and led by a UW-Green Bay faculty and/or staff member. Programs are typically 2 to 4 weeks in duration, department specific, and vary from year to year. These courses occur during the winter, summer, and spring breaks.

Most faculty-led travel courses have an estimated cost of \$3,000-\$6,000. These are generally inclusive of **ALL** costs except some meals and personal spending. Costs are based on a minimum number of students.

## UW-GREEN BAY COSTS

Academic Year costs (2017-2018) at UW-Green Bay\*

Tuition (Wisconsin resident):	\$7,878/per year
Estimated additional expenses: <small>(i.e. books, accommodation, meals, misc. expenses)</small>	\$11,522
Total (including tuition)=	\$19,400/per year
<b>Divide by 2 =</b>	<b>\$9,700/per semester</b> <small>(approximate cost)</small>

## Financial Aid

Talk with a Financial Aid advisor about your options for study abroad.

You may qualify for additional loans or financial aid, specific grants such as the GI Bill or tribal grants, or you might be eligible for scholarships such as the Gilman or other need-based awards.

### Make sure to meet with an advisor early!

Eligibility depends on program term, what you have taken already in aid, number of credits and other factors.

## Ideas on how to save for a Study Abroad Program

- Choose a program that meets your needs and plan for those costs
- Meet with Financial Aid
- Find a job (or work more hours)
- Make a budget (and stick to it!)
- Open a savings account (save a % of your paycheck)
- Apply for scholarships and grants
- Buy generic and splurge less (even one less coffee or dinner out helps!)
- Plan a virtual yard sale (E-Bay, Craigslist, etc.) or fundraise through a bake sale, carwash, running errands, etc.
- Use Crowdfunding or a similar site to raise money online
- Ask family, friends, coworkers, local organizations, etc. to donate to your program fund
- Approach newspapers or civic organizations (Rotary, Lions Club) to donate in exchange for interviews, presentations, etc.
- Meet with returned or exchange students from your program to get an idea of personal spending costs
- Look for flight deals to your destination
- Use student discounts abroad
