One of the most thrilling ways that the Adult Degree Program and its supporters help our students is through the awarding of scholarships. Background on the Wyngaard Scholarship

The **Elizabeth Eleanor Wyngaard Scholarship** provides tuition assistance for non-traditional freshman and sophomore students over the age of 25. The family of "Betsy" Wyngaard established the scholarship after her untimely death in November 1997. The scholarship fund recognizes students in the Adult Degree Program who demonstrate the maturity, ability and motivation to enter and complete a bachelor's degree offered in a non-traditional format.

Background on the Hoppe Scholarship

The **Patricia L. Hoppe Scholarship** is made available to UW-Green Bay Adult Degree Program students by the family and friends of Trish Hoppe. Trish was a vivacious and wonderful woman who was a student in the Program. Cancer took Trish's life before she could complete her degree. Before she passed away, she expressed her desire to help other nontraditional students achieve their educational and career goals.

Background on the Olski Scholarship

The **Dr. Katharine Olski Scholarship** is made available to Adult Degree Program students by the friends of Katharine Olski. Dr. Olski started in 1977 at UWGB with the "University Without Walls" program that later became the Extended Degree Program that is now the Adult Degree Program. In 1981-82 Dr. Olski became the Director of the Program which thrived under her leadership. Upon her retirement in 1997, students and friends of Dr. Olski established this scholarship in her honor.

Apply for the Management Women Scholarship

Applications are now being accepted for the Management Women, Inc. Scholarship for the 2007-08 academic year. All female students are encouraged to review the application criteria to determine their eligibility and to apply. Note that applicants for this scholarship must be **sponsored** by a member of Management Women, and former Adult Degree Program Director, Dr. Dottie Stepien, has offered to sponsor applicants from our program. Applicants for this scholarship must meet the following criteria:

1. Applicant must be female.
2. Applicant must be sponsored by a current member of Management Women.
3. Applicant must possess at least a high school diploma or equivalent by June of the year of application.
4. Applicant must attend a post-secondary institution in the school year immediately following the notification of the award.
5. Applicant must submit a COMPLETED application, including transcripts, postmarked or received no later than **1 April 2007**.

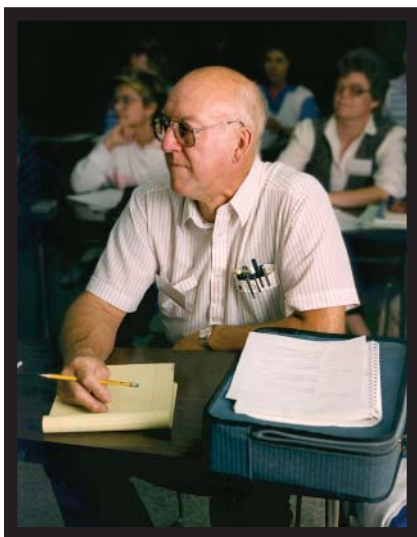

A 14-week semester? Major change appears likely for academic calendar

In a note to representatives of campus governance, Chancellor Bruce Shepard laid out a preliminary plan and timetable for the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay to transition from a 15-week to a 14-week class schedule. The proposal will go before the February meeting of the Faculty Senate. A preference survey, governance involvement and various presentations on the academic advantages of the proposal have contributed momentum to the push toward changing the current calendar. A decision on this change is required by March 1, followed by appointment of an ad hoc implementation committee, if the new calendar is to take effect for the 2008-09 academic year. “Communication Skills” listed as #1 quality/skill desired by employers

Just in from the annual survey conducted by the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) – those surveyed indicated that “Communication Skills – verbal and written” shared top billing along with “Honesty/Integrity” as the main skill or quality desired by employers today. These two skills ranked at 4.7 on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being “extremely important”. Other qualities coming in with a ranking of 4.5/5 were: Interpersonal skills, Motivation/Initiative, Strong Work Ethic, and Teamwork Skills. '01, shares his thoughts, experiences, and philosophy on work, public education, and the value of a college degree.

Tell me a little about your career at MHHS.

WD "My career has been going extremely well since I graduated from UWGB's Adult Degree Program. I have been teaching in the Milwaukee Public School District for six years now. I have also coached basketball here for two of those years. It is a challenge, but I enjoy it."

What is your motivation for success?

WD "My motivation for success has been my will to achieve in life. I am also motivated by my desire to make my parents happy. There were times in my life when I feel that I let my parents down in regards to my education, and I felt that completing my degree was one way to pay them back and to make them happy."

How has your degree from UWGB helped you?

WD "My degree from UW-Green Bay's Adult Degree Program

marked the beginning of my success. The day I completed my degree marked that day that no one could hold me back from getting a job in the career that I wanted to pursue. My degree continues to open doors for me that were closed before.

What are some of the things that you remember about your time in the Adult Degree Program?

WD "I remember my very first class at UW-Green Bay. I was so excited to be back in school that I got a speeding ticket driving to class! Also, graduation was important for me as it was the first time I had ever attended a graduation ceremony. It was also important for my family – especially my father. My father passed away very soon after I graduated. It has been very difficult for me to deal with, but it brings me happiness knowing that he saw me graduate from college."

Any parting thoughts for us?

WD "My 2 ½ years in the Adult Degree Program at UW-Green Bay was a great college experience. There were very few African-Americans in the program and I was always made to feel welcome. If it were not for the ADP I don't know where I would be today, I would like to thank everyone who has helped me along the way in reaching my goal of completing my degree. I am proud to be an alumnus of UW-Green Bay!"
