- \$300,000 shifted from other accounts
- \$1.7 of the \$3.4 Million from CARES Act must go to emergency grants
- Working on process to administer, make as easy as possible










ADMITS: FALL 2019 VS. 2020

FY21 SCENARIOS

Modeling Possible Enrollment & Funding Outcomes



WHAT WE KNOW NOW

- Cash balances are currently healthy
- Loss of over \$2 million in revenue in past six weeks
- Incurred \$600,000 in additional expenses related to COVID
- Receipt of \$1.7 million from federal CARES relief act
- \$1.1 million structural deficit on Fund 103;
 decrease from over \$2 million two years ago

- \$650,000 or more tuition shortfall across all four locations
- Over \$1 million overspend on Fund 131
- 5% budget lapse or \$1.4 million to be returned to the state of Wisconsin in current fiscal year



NEXT STEPS

- Identify \$1.4 million lapse from balances
- Immediately begin reducing \$1.1 million structural deficit on Fund 103
- Immediately identify Fund 131 overspend
- Scenario preparation for fiscal year end and FY21
- Must act to ensure structural deficits do not deplete cash reserves
- Inaction results in depletion of cash balances within two years

- We are entering the crisis from a financially stable position




WHAT THREATS DO WE FACE?
