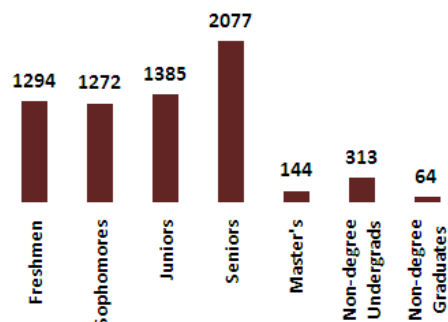

Students complete an array of lectures, labs and discussion sections, and independent learning activities (such as internships and individual research projects).

In a Fall 2009, students enrolled in 698 sections of lecture courses and 107 labs and discussions.

Faculty and academic staff teach all lectures and most labs and discussions.

Approximately 5% of all credit is earned through independent activities.

Very few undergraduate lecture courses contain more than 75 students. A quarter are very small, with under 20 students. The most typical class contains between 20 and 40 students. The median class contains 29 students.

UW-Green Bay's student-faculty ratio is 25-to-1.
