What is Lifelong Learning Institute?

The Lifelong Learning Institute (LLI) is a member-led program sponsored by the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay's Division of Continuing Education and Community Engagement for adults who are interested in learning. As evidenced by this catalog, LLI offers courses of various lengths on a wide variety of topics each semester. There are no tests, papers or credits, but there are classrooms and instructors with lots of opportunities for questions, comments and discussion.

Membership Fee: \$125 per member per year, includes UW-Green Bay parking registration for one year. Membership year can be either Sept. 1-Aug. 31 or Jan. 1-Dec. 31.

Refund Policy: No membership or course fees refunds.

Course Locations: Locations are shown with course descriptions. A complete list is found on p. 1.

Inclement Weather Policy: Watch your local television news stations for cancellation of “**Lifelong Learning – UW-Green Bay**” classes or Green Bay Public School System/Weather cancellations.

UW-Green Bay Parking: LLI members must submit their license plate number to the LLI Office at the time of registration. Please park in the proper areas, not in visitor lots or in 15-minute parking zones, etc. or you will be ticketed. License plate must face aisle.

Registration Process

- Registration will open on **Monday, July 16, 2018.**
- Register for up to 30 courses and prioritize selections beginning with ‘1’ for your highest priority selection. Use each priority once. Recheck priority numbers!
- When registering online, be sure to click ‘Submit’ to finalize your registration. You will receive an email confirmation within minutes that will confirm your registration was successful.
- Only one person can register on an email address. Spouses/others must have a separate email address to register online.
- Registration closes **Friday, August 3, 2018 at midnight.**

CHANGE OF PROCESS, PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

Your confirmation letter will be **mailed by August 10, 2018**, and will list the courses in which you are enrolled. There will no longer be a waitlist process. **If there is a course that you did not get in, it is your responsibility to contact the coordinator of that class.** As there are no waitlists going forward, members may contact the coordinator of a course and ask to be added to that course in the event of a cancellation. **Do not call the office.**

Registration may be completed online, by mail or in person. Online registration is preferable. (It saves time and money.) If you choose to register using the form in the catalog, please mail it or drop it off at the LLI office so that **we have it by Friday, August 3, 2018.** The LLI office is located in Instructional Services (IS) 1040, at UW-Green Bay. Hours are Monday-Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m. and Friday 8 a.m.-12 p.m. You can mail your registration to:

Continuing Member Registration: You will receive an email with an online link to the registration software. Your account with the online software is based on your email address. If you have changed your email address since the last time you registered, please contact the office prior to your registration at 920-465-2356 so we can change it in the system.

New Member Registration: Please register online by going to www.uwgb.edu/lli and clicking on the registration link.

Linked Registration: If you and your spouse or significant other have only one vehicle and therefore must register for the same courses, please each register separately, but be sure you register for the **exact same classes using the exact same priority numbers.** Register online, mail or deliver your “linked” registrations in the same envelope, for “linked” inclusion in the lottery. Linked registrations must be identical to be processed. If your class selections and priorities are not identical, leave the “link” field blank!

Registration Confirmation: A confirmation letter will be **mailed by Friday, August 10, 2018.** Do not call the office looking for confirmation.

Keep your catalog. Your confirmation letter will only indicate the first session of each course. The remaining sessions are listed in your catalog. Please check the catalog or the calendar insert to prevent overlapping of your selections.








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
