The course will help you develop your own skills in policy analysis and give you some understanding of the major public policy issues that are important today - and a way to evaluate them for yourself. My goal is to get you interested in understanding and influencing the public policies that are made at all levels of government, now and once the class is over.

Clickers

We will use clickers every day in class for points beginning the second week of classes. It is your responsibility to have your clicker with you and functional every class. 1. IN-CLASS CLICKER QUESTIONS

75 PTS

Each class, students will have the opportunity to answer 3 clicker questions worth one point each (incorrect response or absent, 0 points). Your scores will be uploaded to D2L grades weekly. Questions will be on the assigned readings or discussion topics. You will have the opportunity to earn about 80 clicker points overall, so in case you have to miss class, you can still earn an A on this portion of your grade.

2. CURRENT POLICY ISSUE PAPER (5-7 PAGES) AND WIKI

Papers. Submit issue paper plans in D2L drop box "Issue Paper Plan." Submit Issue Papers as hard.copy the date assigned for your category. Follow a local, state, or national policy issue that interests you. Complete the project plan to get your topic approved (15 points). During the week that the whole class covers your policy area, be a part of a discussion to share what you have learned with your classmates (e.g., if your topic is No Child Left Behind, it is discussed the week the class learns about Education Policy).

Wiki. Each student will post a synopsis of their policy issue research in our class wiki, providing an interactive link and picture along with important content to bring your peers up to speed on your policy issue.

3. POLICY ISSUE D2L DISCUSSIONS

50 PTS

Reflect on your peers' issue paper topics in the D2L Discussion section for 5 of the 6 topic areas. Your posts must be 1) made before we have our discussion on that topic in class; 2) a direct reaction to someone's policy issue; 3) meaningful and thoughtful posts containing at least 3 or 4 thoughtful sentences, not quick points like "that's a great idea" or "I liked the picture" or "I did my paper on that topic too."

4. CURRENT EVENT EXERCISES

60 PTS

During the semester you will complete 6 small exercises based on the topics we are studying as we move through the semester. These exercises, worth 10 points each, will be done through the D2L Quiz feature.

5. **TESTS** TEST 1 AND 2: 50 PTS EACH; FINAL 100 PTS

For tests 1 and 2, multiple choice questions will be worth 50 points. For the final, there will be 75 points on multiple choice questions and a take-home portion will be worth 25 points and will be submitted in a D2L Dropbox.
