What is Advanced Placement United States History?

AP U.S. History is a challenging class that is the equivalent of a college course and provides students an opportunity to earn college credit by participating in the AP testing. It is a two - semester survey of American history from the age of exploration and discovery to the present. Solid reading and writing skills, along with a willingness to devote considerable time to homework and study are necessary to succeed. Emphasis is placed on critical and evaluative thinking skills, essay writing, interpretation of original documents, a historical knowledge, and historiography.

Grading Policy:

All student work is due when posted on the calendar which is available on the class website. All late work will incur an opportunity cost and be considered for determining placement on the Success Skills for that term.

A summative assessment will not be given to the student until all formative work is completed and shows student proficiency. Formative work turned in the day of a summative



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assessment will result in the student taking the summative assessment at a later time, but not during a future class. The teacher needs time to review the formative work to check for proficiency.

Grades will represent an individual's work.

Your academic grade will be determined based on your academic performance on a variety of summative assessments throughout the semester. Each summative assessment will focus on one of our "reportable standards"; Writing like a historian, Reading like a historian, Presenting like a historian and Knowing what a historian knows. Each summative assessment will be assessed using a proficiency scale (and possibly a rubric) in order to determine your level of performance in one of the reportable standards.

Your term grade will be determined based upon the summative assessments that have been completed in relation to each of the reportable standards. Once the teacher has assessed the student work, the assignment will be entered into the Skyward gradebook in the corresponding reportable standards. At the end of each term, the level of proficiency in each reportable standard will be averaged in order to come up with a letter grade for the term.

Term and semester grades are based upon a running records format in which all summative assessments are used as evidence in determining the student's level of proficiency and grade. Terms are not necessarily weighted numerically or equally.

Reflect-Relearn-Redo

While it is our goal for you to succeed in your first assessment we realize that you may desire another opportunity to demonstrate mastery. Here are the policies and procedures if you want to participate in a reflect + relearn + redo for a summative assessment.

Students are expected to demonstrate a good faith effort to be prepared for each scheduled assessment. Students will not be afforded a relearn/redo opportunity if they fail to demonstrate acceptable effort on the assessment or if they miss the deadline for the summative assessment.

Students will propose a relearn plan of action a week after the assessment is returned that will either be accepted, modified or denied by the teacher. The teacher may add to the plan of action. Evidence of student re-learning must be shared with the teacher. Students need to demonstrate increased knowledge and/or proficiency in the relearn process before they are able to re-do an assessment.



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Students must complete the accepted plan of action and all the terms included in it, by the deadline set by student and teacher. The plan of action may need to be modified along the way as deemed necessary by the teacher.

The highest score of the assessments will be reported. However, if the re-learn redo is completed after a term ends it will not be put in retroactively. In other words, while it will change your semester grade it will not change a previously posted term grade .

Redo opportunities may not be afforded to all assessments, particularly in the knowing section.

Cheating Policy:

Cheating or plagiarism will not be tolerated. Students will receive an immediate 1 on their Success Skills as well as a detention and will be required to do a new assignment that mirrors the one that was cheated on.

Attendance Policy:

It is the student's responsibility to inquire about work missed. Any missing work is considered incomplete and will need to be completed.
