Course Emphasis

This course develops skills in speaking, reading, writing, listening and understanding related to the Spanish language and the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. Students in Spanish V practice pronunciation and conversation in simulated real-world situations. Spanish V reviews all grammatical concepts through thematic and fun vocabulary! Students in Spanish V will make cultural comparisons between the US and the Spanish Speaking world through reading, writing and conversations. The class will be conducted entirely in Spanish and students are expected to participate in the target language as well.

- 8. Obtain skills to help them qualify for professional work in various areas such as teaching, translating and interpreting, positions in business appropriate to students in the languages or be prepared to attend graduate school.
- 9. Reflect on the social values of the culture(s) they are studying and be able to draw reasoned comparisons to their own culture on topics important to the culture(s) being studied.

EXPECTATIONS:

- 1. Review and Refine prior grammatical concepts.
- 2. Increase vocabulary.
- 3. Express oneself in the target language.
- 4. Exposure to cultural celebrations, music and literature in Spain and Latin America

PARTICIPATION:

Taking a language class is different than other classes you may take, because in order to fully learn the language, you have to practice it through speaking to others. Although for some students, speaking in front of peers may be an intimidating and a scary experience, we do many activities throughout the year to establish a caring, non-threatening community where most students feel safe speaking in front of others. We know that everyone will make mistakes—in fact, we encourage mistakes because they are the only way we can learn!

Attendance, Absence and Punctuality:

Be here—everyday—on time!

If a student is absent, it is his/her responsibility to first consult other classmates and then the teacher for notes, handouts, homework assignments, project deadlines, etc. It is a wise idea to have a friend in the class that can collect handouts, take notes, etc. for you if you are absent. Make-up homework can be submitted for full credit in a time frame equivalent to the number of days missed. Students must write "AUSENTE" and the date that he/she was absent on the assignment. Please clear exceptions individually with the instructor.

As most quizzes and tests will be announced with advance notice, absent students will be required to make up late assessments the day after they return. Please clear exceptions individually with the instructor prior to the absence.

Grading:

The school grading scale will be used to calculate student understanding of course material each quarter. A student's semester grade is composed of summative (tests, papers, projects and participation) 60%, formative work (10%), and the semester exam (20%). Re-takes are not allowed without the teacher's consent. You must have an average of a B or higher for BOTH semesters to receive full UWGB credit.
