In the year 1995, Dr. Ronni Sanlo, Director of the Lesbian and Gay Programs Office at the University of Michigan, created the first Lavender Graduation ceremony at the University of Michigan. Lavender graduation ceremonies are now held all over the United States. Campuses that wish to acknowledge the achievements of graduating LGBTQ+ students in the presence of other students, family, friends, faculty and staff, hold private Lavender Graduations to provide a safe environment for LGBTQ+ graduates, many whom may be closeted. Mai Lo Lee, currently the Director of Multi Ethnic Student Affairs (MESA), took the initiative to start the first Lavender Graduation at UW-Green Bay in spring 2012. The Lavender Graduation for the Pride Center includes live music, a buffet, acknowledgement of the graduates with the dispensing of the Lavender cord to be worn at graduation, Leadership Awards for Students, Staff and Faculty, presentation of certificates for students who have completed the criteria for the LGBTQ Certificate Program, and new this year, the Pride Lifetime Achievement Award for an individual who has provided long term support of the Pride Center.

In January 2011, the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay Pride Center was established by the Founding members: Christine Smith, Joanie Dovekas, Debra Rezac, Steve Zywicki, and the four original interns: Jack Melberg, Rory Cowart, Miranda Seitz, and Kit Wise.

Originally called the LGBTQA Resource Center, the Pride Center's creation was based on a knowledge of an unspoken presence of LGBTQ+ students on campus. The Pride Center's goals were to educate the community, serve as a resource, and to give these students a place where they can feel safe and find others like them.

An idea became a need for a space to put the mission into action, they started scouting out rooms. The founders decided on a room that used to be an old storage closet in the University Union, converting it to two small rooms, an office, and a social room. The Pride Center started with no funding -- they were all volunteering their time -- before receiving a grant from Rainbow Over Wisconsin The Pride Center started with it only being open 20 hours a week, which is a major change to how it is now. Stacie Christian started in May 2011, working 10 hours a week in the Pride Center.

The Pride Center has grown, there are now three rooms an office, a quiet room, and a social room. The Center is now staffed by Dr. Stacie Christian as a full-time Director, and she leads a team of 14 interns. The Pride Center now serves roughly 80 students daily and has come a long way with a goal to continue to grow.

Mai J. Lo Lee started the first Lavender Graduation at UWGB, which is a graduation that recognizes LGBTQ+ students that are graduating. The 2020 Lavender Graduation highlights the successes of students of the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, and spotlights the strengths of the LGBTQ+ community in Northeast Wisconsin.

Sydney was a UWGB student majoring in Public Administration with an emphasis in Nonprofit and Emergency Management and minors in Human Development and Political Science. She was also a UWGB Pride Center Intern Fall 2019.

Green Bay was the first place that I was able to be freely out of the closet with amazing, supportive people surrounding me, and for that I am immensely grateful.

One of the best things about being at this university for the last few years was seeing the Pride Center grow as much as it has from when I first arrived. As a freshman, I spent a lot of my time in the little tiny room we called our Pride Center before the expansion. More often than not, you would walk in and struggle to find a place to sit because of how many friends were jam packed into the room - we never saw this as a negative thing, we always saw it as an opportunity to get close with our friends and have an amazing time. We were grateful for what safe space we had. I was so happy to finally have a community to belong to. The "elder gays" - the queer upperclassmen who took us freshmen under their wings at the time - were some of the most influential people of my life, and I still talk to many of them as good friends, and they inspired me to start my advocacy work to make sure LGBTQ+ voices were heard in the UWGB community. They urged me to become the Pride Center representative in the Student Government Association and the Residence Hall Apartment Association. Emma Carter, one of the original "elder gays" and one of my best friends, inspired me to get involved in the Sexuality and Gender Alliance (SAGA), and run as an officer.

Four years pass. The Pride Center gets an expansion, and all of us who had been working so hard for queer advocacy on campus celebrate. I filter through many positions in different student organizations, including serving as President of SAGA, President of Student Government, Intern at the Pride Center, Resident Assistant of the Safe and Inclusive Living in Residence Life, upon so many more... I've had so many amazing opportunities, like taking a whole delegation to Omaha, Nebraska for MBLTACC, doing Safe Ally Training for classes and professors, and hosting an on-campus Ally Conference. PRIDE LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT LEADERSHIP AWARD

The Pride Center is presenting this award for the first time. The purpose of this award is to recognize an individual who has gone above and beyond to support the Pride Center with its mission to "identify and respond to the concerns and needs of LGBTQ students, faculty, staff, and their allies; to provide high-quality support services that contribute to the academic and personal growth of LGBTQ+ students, faculty, staff and allies; and to offer a safe, supportive, and welcoming environment for LGBTQ people and their allies."

The first recipient of this award, Joanie Dovekas, is one of the Founding members of the Pride Center. Joanie, along with other Pride Center Founders, envisioned the need for safe space within UW-Green Bay for LGBTQ+ and questioning students and friends to have a room to talk to others about their life experiences. The LGBTQA Resource Center opened in January 2011, and was renamed the Pride Center in 2014.

Joanie has provided support for the Pride Center via her work in the LGBTQ+ affirming community organization Positive Voice, which has provided financial support to the Pride Center, and for the Pride Middle School and High School Leadership camps. Joanie was an active Professional Advisory Committee member for the Pride Center for many years; a co-chair for the Pride Employee Resource Groups since its inception; and provided many hours assisting and supporting Pride Center game nights, educational events, potlucks, Clothing Swaps and donations for the Campus Cupboard and Closet. Joanie has always been a positive influence for students and to the community advocating for support of the Pride Center and its students, faculty and staff.

For many of the 19 years Joanie served as the Assistant Director of Residence Life at UW-Green Bay, Joanie ensured that the Area Coordinators and Resident Assistants received inclusivity and equity training for diverse groups including LGBTQ+. In addition, Joanie was one of the co-writers for a plan to create a floor in residence life to provide safe and inclusive housing for LGBTQ+ and their allies. Safe and Inclusive Living (SAIL) opened in 2014 which positively impacted the health of many LGBTQ+ students who felt safe in affirming housing. In 2018, Joanie received the Robert E. Mosier Professional Enrichment Award which recognizes an individual in the Upper Midwest Region who has made outstanding contributions to the professional development of colleagues in college housing.

For our grateful appreciation of her dedicated service to the affirmation of the Pride Center LGBTQ+ community, we recognize and thank **Joanie Dovekas** by presenting to her the first Pride Leadership Lifetime Achievement Award.

SAFE ALLY TRAINING, INCLUSIVITY & EQUITY CERTIFICATE PROGRAM & LGBTQ STUDIES CERTIFICATE PROGRAM





SAFE Ally Level 1: SAFE Ally Level 1 training provides basic information on vocabulary, the use of pronouns and current topics regarding LGBTQ+ individuals. Attendees learn how to be a better ally and receive a SAFE Ally sticker for display by their office desk or residence hall door.

SAFE Ally Level 1.5: SAFE Ally Level 1.5 moves quickly pasts topics of pronouns and vocabulary and spends more time on current topics and experiences of LGBTQ+ individuals and their families. Personal experiences of individuals who are transgender and non-binary is a primary focus of this training. Attendees learn more about personal advocacy for LGBTQ+. Attendees receive a SAFE Ally sticker for display by their office desk or resident hall door.

SAFE Ally Level 2: SAFE Ally Level 2 training provides information on LGBTQ+ topics including health, organizational policies and laws, advocacy trends, and other information that provides advanced insight on what topics affect LGBTQ+ at this current point in time. Attendees will receive a certificate upon completion of this training.

Inclusivity & Equity Certificate Program

The **Chancellor's Council on Diversity and Inclusive Excellence** is pleased to announce a certificate program which is designed to develop and recognize commitment to the UW-Green Bay Inclusive Excellence initiative. This certificate program consists of a combination of professional development, self-study, and community service. The program will eventually include three outcome levels:

Level One Certificate (Learner):

Growth of knowledge and experience with Inclusivity and Equity issues

 Recipient has completed professional development coursework, community service, and self-study that has given them the knowledge and experience needed to respect and accept diverse individuals through personal behavior and communication.

Level Two Certificate (Advocate):

Hands-on service and enriched experience with Inclusivity and Equity issues

- · Recipient is able to contribute to discussions about diverse topics.
- Recipient can notify leaders of concerns in the workplace that may not be inclusive.
- · Recipient shows respect for diverse individuals and can advocate for change.

Level Three Certificate (Leader):

Leadership in Inclusivity and Equity initiatives on campus

- Recipient demonstrates their ability to identify, take responsibility and follow through with changes that foster inclusivity.
- Recipient shows initiative to share information, advocate, celebrate and reward individuals who are inclusive.

Inclusivity and Equity Certificate Requirements (Level 1)

- a. A total of <u>20 combined hours</u> of professional development, community service, and/or self-study is required for a Level 1 certificate, including the following minimum requirements:
 - One 4-hour Promoting Inclusivity and Equity at the University of Wisconsin Green Bay course (required workshop offered at the beginning of each semester)
 - This course will be offered in two 2-hour segments each academic semester, and in a full 4-hour segment during the summer.
 - 2 hours of community service

I.

- iii. 4 hours of in-person professional development
- iv. 10 more hours of any combination of professional development, community service, and/or self-study which meets the intent of the Inclusivity and Equity Certificate Program.

b. How you combine the above requirements above is up to you, but the minimum hours must be met, and each topic below must below must be covered. The chart below lists required topics of training, self-study, and/or community service and examples of ways to fulfill the requirements (examples are NOT all-inclusive):

Race, ethnicity, and/or national origin Examples include: Race, ethnicity, and/or national origin in-person professional development Attendance and/or service at a multicultural event Off-campus diversity or inclusivity conference

Students have the opportunity to earn a cord to wear at graduation and a certificate that is worthy of placing on a resume. Inclusivity and Equity Certificate Program provides students an opportunity to learn about how to be more inclusive of diverse individuals and groups, and how to be more equitable in the community and in the workplace. These are skills that are highly sought by employees in today's global economy.

Students who earn the certificate have completed Student Foundations training, and participate in a total of 24 hours of inclusive excellence training at the four coastal campuses and in our communities. The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer Studies Certificate Program was created in 2017 with the purpose of helping students or community members "think informatively and critically about the lives and contributions of LGBTQ people, to respect the dignity of LGBTQ people, and to understand and interact with a culture that contributes to the diversity of our world." To earn the certificate, students must complete a 15 -credit sequence, including a "high-impact practice" such as an internship or research assistantship related to LGBTQ studies. Spring 2020 graduates Emily Gerlivkovski and Abbie Wagaman will be the first two students to earn this certificate, and we are proud of their accomplishments. The Women's and Gender Studies program also hopes that this certificate will help demonstrate the need for additional curricula in this area and for the importance of LGBTQ+ studies in all classes. Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer Studies

Certificate Program

The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ) Studies Certificate Program, housed administratively in the Women and Gender Studies Program, is a campus-wide program open to students in any major. Consistent with UWGB's problem-focused, interdisciplinary traditions, course work is available across a broad range of fields, including, but not limited to Women's and Gender Studies, Democracy and Justice Studies, Human Development, History, English, and Humanities. The certificate also includes additional training in diversity and the development of a participantdirected, high impact practice such as an internship, research project or other practicum.

The LGBTQ Studies Certificate Program provides participants with a background in the history and lived experiences of Gender, Sexuality, and Romantic Minorities (GSRMs). The Certificate is participant-driven, allowing those enrolled to select courses and experiences directed by areas of interest (e.g., persons interested in the helping professions may seek a relevant internship in Human Development, Social Work, or Psychology; literary fans could study GSRMs through English electives and stage a reading of Oscar Wilde; the possibilities are endless). As such, the Certificate allows participants to work with an Advisor to cater the Certificate to their interests. For some, this could involve completing coursework across a number of different program areas: others will find that clustering coursework within a narrow field is most appropriate

The certificate is available to current students majoring in any field and members of the community who wish to think informatively and critically about the lives and contributions of LGBTQ people, to respect the dignity of LGBTQ people, and to understand and interact with a culture that contributes to the diversity of our world. A defining feature of this Certificate is completion of a participant-directed high impact practice, some examples include activities such as a(n):

- independent study: Queer Theory symposium
- · honors project: stage a public reading of a play by Oscar Wilde
- Internship: volunteer at a local organization working with at-risk LGBTQ youth; develop and promote LGBTQ-themed programs for the Student Union
- research assistantship: assisting a faculty member on relationship study with same-sex couples; oral history of LGBTQ elders

Participants completing an LGBTQ Studies Certificate should demonstrate knowledge of the following concepts and issues:

- 1. The socio-cultural and historical construction of gender and sexual identities
- 2. Intersectionality of gender and sexuality with race/ethnicity, religion, class, and nationality,
- 3. How to effectively challenge bigotry, inequality, and systems of oppression, including those based on gender and sexuality
- 4. Major issues pertaining to the lives of LGBTQ people, historically and in contemporary societies (e.g. representations of LGBTQ individuals; the impact of gueer culture on the dominant culture; violence; relationships between LGBTQ individuals/communities and institutions such as the medical and mental health professions, the law, religion, the media, education, and the military; family; and the LGBTO Community and work.

Students must complete Ally Training I and II prior to declaring the certificate.

CAMPUS CUPBOARD HISTORY

Historically, when students indicated they were in need of food, staff or faculty and staff would give them a can or two from canned food they might have in their offices. The Pride Center, in response to students who were financially supporting themselves due to disconnect from families, started to provide can goods for a meal or two, or occasionally for a weekend for students who could not access a community food pantry, or who might miss classes during a food pantry's service hours. As the requests from students both in the Pride Center and on the campus increased the Campus Cupboard food pantry, consisting of three shelves of food, opened spring 2016, in the current Grill location. Once the Grill was opened, the food pantry was moved temporarily to a classroom in Wood Hall.

The current permanent location opened in fall 2017, in RH 140. The space was name CKOne because it included the student org Campus Kitchen, which collected food items that would have been tossed in from restaurants and then created meals out of them, and the Campus Cupboard which was a student org, and then the Campus Closet which was to be managed by the Pride Center. The Campus Cupboard is stocked by employee and public financial donations via UW-Green Bay Advancement, campus food drives, and a few communities food drives, and students, employees and community members who bring in food donations. Funding is also provided to the Campus Cupboard Student Org via SUFAC funds. The Campus Cupboard now can provide food or funding as needed for the UW-Manitowoc, UW-Sheboygan, and the UW-Marinette campuses.

Currently at UW-Green Bay, the Campus Cupboard has a temporary location near the Resident Life Community Center so students who live off and on campus can gain easy access to food. Students who wish to order food that they can pick up within 48 hours, do so by completing a simple form



An Asexual is someone who experiences little to no sexual attraction. While celibacy is a choice, asexuality, like other orientations, is inherent and therefore not a choice. Asexuality has nothing to no with sexual orientation and people who are asexuals can identify with a sexual orientation (Heterosexual, Homosexual, Bisexual, etc). The Asexuality Social Group is for asexuals and their allies for social support, learning and fun.

Bisexual and Pansexual Social Group

A Bisexual is someone who is sexually attracted to individuals of the same gender as themselves and individuals of different genders/gender presentations from themselves. A Pansexual is someone who is sexual attracted towards individuals not based on gender. The Bisexual and Pansexual Support Group is for bisexuals, pansexuals, and their allies for social support, learning and fun.

Transgender Social and Support Group

Transgender is an umbrella term that describes a person whose gender identity does not match the sex they were assigned with at birth. The Transgender Social and Support Group is for Transgender people and those questioning their gender for a supportive and learning environment.

Pride Center UWGB Alumni Group

The Pride Center UWGB Alumni Group is an opportunity for UWGB Alumni to stay in touch after graduation. Many UWGB Alumni did not have access to a Pride Center, which opened at UWGB in 2012, but would like to meet and stay in contact with UWGB Alumni who are LGBTQ or allies today. Pride Employee Resource Group

The Pride Employee Resource Group (Pride ERG) started in Fall 2015. Employee Resource Groups, sometimes known as Affinity Groups, are often available within larger organizations as a means to meet other like-minded individuals who support a common goal. As the first ERG at UWGB, the Pride ERG provides opportunities for LGBTQ employees to meet with each other once a month in a relaxed off-campus location in order to provide opportunities for socialization and support for UWGB LGBTQ employees. Supporting the goals and programming of the UWGB Pride Center is another focus of this group. Gender Terminology:

Gender Identity: A person's internal sense of being male, female, or non-binary

Gender Expression: Refers to the way a person communicates gender to others through their behavior, clothing, hairstyle, voice or body characteristics

Sex: What individuals are medically assigned at birth based on their genitals and primary sexual characteristics (male, female, intersex).


Cisgender: term that describes a person whose gender identity matches the gender assigned to them at birth. This is a "privileged" identity.



WHAT'S A DEAD NAME?

- A dead name is the name that was given to a trans* person at birth
 - Aka: Birth name, given name, assigned name, othername, etc.
- Is it okay to use a dead name?
 - No, unless the trans* person explicitly allows you to, or is in a situation where their safety is a priority.
- Is it okay is ask a trans* person what their dead name is?
 - No, that is not information you need to know.
 - You may only learn a trans* persons dead name if they give it, but do not ask




