You must be a paid member at least one week before class registration if you wish to priority register on December 9. Already a member? If you joined in July in August, you will automatically receive your registration link—no action needed.



You may register for up to 15 courses during the initial registration period. Only register for the number of classes you are able to attend, as a place will be reserved in your name. Have your list of classes ready ahead of time!



If a course is full, it will say 'Waitlist.' If you wish to be added to the waitlist, please select the waitlisted class. Waitlisted classes do not count towards your 15 courses. Please note: Due to high registration volume, you may not know that you are waitlisted for a course until you receive your confirmation letter.

Please be sure to click "Submit" at the end of registration. You will know that your registration has been successful when you receive a final screen with the UW-Green Bay Phoenix logo.

Watch for your confirmation email, which should arrive within 48 hours of registration. Make sure to check your "spam," "junk" or "promotions" folders. Your confirmation email serves as your Confirmation Letter. Please mark your classes on your calendar! You will not receive a second confirmation.






