FERPA

The Family Education Right to Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law designed to protect the education records of students. In the university setting, it gives the enrolled student, regardless of age, control of their education records held by the university.

The university may release student information to parents in the event of a health/safety emergency, violation of the law, or for IRS tax purposes.

Students may grant guest access to an "Authorized Party," in the Student Information System (SIS) where parents or others can view the student's financial account and make payments.

TIMELINE

December

- Student Billing will post tuition charges to the Student Information System (SIS)
- Review your aid offer to ensure it's ready for disbursement on the first day of class

January/February

- 01/22/24: First day of class; aid will begin disbursing
- 02/02/24: Spring charges are due at 4:30 p.m. CST
- In-person payments must be paid by 4:15 p.m. CST

FINANCIAL AID TERM DEFINITIONS

- Cost of Attendance (COA): Estimated annual cost to attend school to help with budgeting purposes. Financial Aid uses this figure to help determine student's eligibility for financial aid
- Disbursement: Process where any accepted financial aid will apply toward charges due
- **Gift Aid:** Funds that are not required to be paid back, such as a scholarships or grants. FAFSA data determines eligibility for need-based aid such as federal and state grants
- **Earned Aid:** Federal Work Study Funds are earned through eligible employment via a bi-weekly paycheck. Work Study Funds do not apply toward educational expenses as gift or borrowed aid would
- Borrowed Aid: Loan funds that will require repayment. The Department of Education offers two different loan types:
 - **Subsidized:** Type of loan that does not accrue interest while student is enrolled at least half-time (6 credits). Loan not required to be paid back until 6 months after graduation or if below half-time status
 - **Unsubsidized:** Type of loan that will accrue interest when loan is disbursed to the student's account. Same grace period as subsidized loan
- Grace Period: Loan borrowers not required to make payments on loan(s) during this period

^{*} Other expenses may include parking, GB Orientation \$212 new freshman or \$60 transfer, distance education fees \$25 per credit

COLLEGE SPEAK

Academic Terms

Add and Drop - Process of changing a course schedule by dropping or adding a course during the prescribed time at the beginning of each semester

Canvas - The online learning system used by UW-Green Bay to facilitate courses, discussion, class materials, assignments, grades, and more

Credit - One credit equals approximately one hour of classroom instruction per week

Curriculum - A program of study made up of a set of courses offered by a school

Degree Program - A planned program of study leading to a bachelor's degree

FERPA - Family Education Right to Privacy Act

General Education Requirement – A component of a degree program that provides a broad based education with required coursework

Hold - A restriction placed on student accounts for academic or financial reasons and generally require action from the student to be removed

Major - A planned program of study leading to a Bachelor's Degree

Minor - A sequence of related courses consisting of 15 or more semester hours of credit

Segregated Fees - Fees assessed to students in order to support facilities, programs, and services that are not academically oriented

Syllabus - The guide that a professor gives a student that outlines class requirements and what it takes to achieve specific grades



People

Advisor - Faculty/staff member that can provide information and assistance on academics

Chancellor - President or chief administrative officer of college or university

Commuter – A student who lives offcampus or at home and travels, or commutes, to campus for class

Dean - An administrator in charge of a division of a university or college

First-Generation College Student - Neither student's parent holds a 4-year college degree

Professor - A university or college-level instructor with the highest rank they can earn

Provost - Senior academic administrator responsible for planning and implementing academic programs and policies.

Resident - A student who lives on campus in a residence hall

Student Ambassadors – A team of student leaders who support the university's outreach efforts to prospective students and newly enrolled students

Vice Chancellor - Senior administrative officer in certain colleges and universities

Financial Terms

EFC - Expected Family Contribution. This is a measurement of a family's financial strength as measured by the FAFSA, and it helps determine a student's financial aid eligibility

FAFSA - Free Application for Federal Student Aid

SAP - Satisfactory Academic Progress. In order to maintain financial eligibility, a student must meet certain standards set by the federal government

What is the difference between a college and a university?

The difference between a college and a university is that a college offers a collection of degrees in one specific area, while a university is a collection of colleges. When you go to a university you are going to be graduating from one of their colleges.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What do I need to do before the semester starts?

- 1. If you haven't already completed all To-Do items on your Wings Portal, please do so as soon as possible.
- 2. Review the New Student Checklist on Page 5 for next steps after GB Orientation.
- 3. Begin the habit of checking your UW-Green Bay email daily for important communication from the university and other items to complete throughout your college experience.

How can I find my UWGB username and password?

To log in to the UW-Green Bay technology systems, including email, SIS, the Wings Portal, Navigate, Canvas, and more, you must set up your student account using the username and password information found in your admissions letter.

Note: when accessing the Wings Portal, include the "@uwgb.edu" with your username. When logging into SIS or for housing, you will not include the "@uwgb.edu." If you need help resetting your password or cannot remember it, please contact the UW-Green Bay IT Service Desk at 920-465-2309.

How do I request accommodations for my classes or living situation?

To receive services with Student Accessibility Services (SAS), you will need to fill out a short application and upload documentation through their website at uwgb.edu/student-accessibility-services. SAS also offers services for alternative testing, note-taking, caption media, alternative format texts, emotional support animals, parking, and more.

What are helpful tips for a commuter student living off campus?

- Get Involved The Student Engagement Center serves as a vibrant hub that
 empowers students to actively participate and contribute to campus life. It provides
 a plethora of opportunities to get involved, from joining clubs and organizations to
 attending workshops and events.
- 2. Find a few places that make you feel comfortable Spend the first couple weeks of the semester exploring campus to find where you like to study, eat, and have fun.
- 3. Get connected to people in your classes Exchange numbers or social media with classmates to study and go to events together.
- 4. Plan ahead Bring all you need to campus for the day, including class materials, computer (and charger), and food/snacks. Allow yourself more time than you think you need to travel to campus, find parking, and navigate bad weather.

If I am living on campus, how do I get my mail?

How do I get a parking permit?

All Green Bay Campus students are assessed a virtual parking permit fee when tuition and fees for the upcoming term are applied to their SIS account. Students who do not use the parking services can easily "opt out" though an option on their SIS account which removes the permit fee. Students at the Manitowoc, Marinette, and Sheboygan Campuses do not need a parking permit.

How do meal plans work?

All students living on the Green Bay Campus must select a meal plan during the Housing check-in process. Green Bay Campus commuter students have the option to add a meal plan to your SIS account or purchase one at the University Ticketing & Information Center (UTIC). Students may request to change or cancel their meal plan within the first two weeks of each semester. Learn more about dining and meal plans at uwgb.edu/dining.

What types of services are available for commuter students?

Commuter Student Services makes sure that commuter students are supported, feel comfortable and have a place to charge devices, print homework, use a microwave, watch TV or even nap on campus. Below are some of the services available.

 off-campus student resource that helps connects students with off-campus
 housing options. Students will benefit from having different options in one
 convenient location.
- 2. Commuter Meal Plans Enjoy convenient, delicious dining options during your busy schedules by choosing one of our meal plans.
- 3. Bus Pass UW Green Bay is connected to the greater Green Bay area via the Green Bay Metro transit service. Green Bay Metro bus passes are provided at no additional cost for current UW-Green Bay students.
- 4. Lockers Keep your belongings safe or drop off your winter gear before class.
